# Kerb and Channel (Gutter) and Vehicle Crossings

#### Policy - external Kerb and Channel and Vehicle Crossings

#### Introduction

The *Roads Act (1993)* enables Council to seek a contribution from the land owner adjoining a public road for cost incurred in constructing kerb and channel along the side of the public road adjacent to the land.

The *Roads Act (1993)* also enables Council to seek payment from a land owner adjoining a public road for the cost incurred in constructing or repairing any special crossing (driveway) over the footway in the public road.

#### **Purpose**

To define the principles that are applied when determining the recovery of costs associated with kerb and channel and special crossings in accordance with the provisions of the *Roads Act 1993*.

#### Scope

This Policy applies to owners of land adjoining a public road who are liable to contribute or pay for the costs incurred by Council in constructing kerb and gutter or constructing or repairing a special crossing (driveway).

This Policy does not apply to the renewal or repair of any kerb and channel of which contributions have previously been paid.

#### **Policy statement**

Council will seek contributions from owners of land adjoining works within the road reserve in accordance with the *Roads Act 1993*.

Council will provide written notice to adjoining land owners to the kerb and channel works before the scheduled start date, advising them of the contribution rate and project timeline.

#### **Principles**

Kerb and channel contributions are calculated as follows:

- 1. The contribution will be based on the frontage of the land adjoining the kerb and channel to be constructed.
  - Residential properties will only be required to contribute to a maximum length of 25 metres, including corner lots.
- Residential properties with dual street frontage having already contributed to kerb and channel for one frontage, will not be required to make a further contribution when the other frontage is kerb and channelled.
- 3. Non-residential (commercial and industrial) properties will be required to contribute to the total length of their frontages constructed.
- 4. Piped gutter crossings and concrete dish crossings which require removal before the kerb and channel construction will be subject to a reduced contribution equivalent to a length of up to four metres.
- 5. Contributions for kerb and channel for dual occupancies or multiple dwellings will be split evenly between owners.

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Vehicle crossings (driveways) previously approved by Council that require adjustments during new kerb and channel construction:

- 1. Existing vehicle crossings that are concreted or sealed will be reconstructed in concrete at no cost to the owner if adjustments are necessary.
- 2. Vehicle crossings steeper than a one in seven grade after new kerb and channel construction will be constructed in concrete to a standard width of four metres at the kerb or a width matching the existing at no charge to the property owner, regardless of whether they are concreted or sealed prior to the kerb and channel construction.

#### **Review and Evaluation**

In accordance with the *Roads Act 1993*, Council will review the amount of kerb and channel contribution annually, as part of the Fees and Charges process.
