

Another year has crept up on us, but there's no tiptoeing about when it comes to Lake Macquarie's momentum heading into 2024.

As our regional city continues to grow, it's exciting to see so much investment and development happening right around the lake.

I recently had the great pleasure of opening the new Trevor Height Athlete Testing Facility as part of the Hunter Sports Centre upgrade, a major milestone for this landmark facility, and I'm looking forward to the Windale Hub coming to life later in the year.

One of our fastest flourishing areas is the city's south-west, where Cooranbong and Morisset accounted for \$264 million of the city's \$1.3 billion in approved developments last financial year.

With the space for new residential and commercial opportunities, proximity to key transport links and major developments like Cedar Mill underway, the area is primed for another boom.

Council has worked hard on a Morisset Place Strategy to help guide future development and growth in the area to make sure we align infrastructure and resources with population growth.

A great example of this future proofing in action was our multi-million dollar NSW Government and Council funded Alton Road intersection upgrade in Cooranbong (pictured), which we unveiled late last year.

Not only will the upgrade improve traffic flow, travel time, safety and connectivity through Cooranbong, it comes as a massive boost to accessibility for emergency services and to goods and services in the town centre.

Looking to the future, expect to see more activity west of the lake as progress is made on two important visitation projects, Trinity Point and BlackRock Motor Park, which will enhance our city's appeal as a tourism destination.

Unlocking new housing supply and business opportunities in these promising pockets is a real bright spot for Lake Macquarie's immediate future, and I can't wait to see more progress as we sail into another productive year.

# BINNED BATTERIES FUEL FIRES MAKE A POSITIVE CHANGE & SAVE LIVES

Did you know that batteries should never be thrown away in kerbside bins?

Batteries can cause fires when mixed with garbage, recyclables and bulk waste.

Across Australia, hundreds of fires occur in garbage trucks and at waste facilities due to incorrect battery disposal, compromising services and putting people at risk of injury.

Firefighters are responding to more than three battery fires a week from in-home charging issues or incorrect disposal, with Fire and Rescue NSW reporting more than 180 battery related fires last year alone.

To help reduce these numbers, households are urged to use, store and dispose of batteries correctly.

Please recycle your used batteries at designated drop off locations, including the Awaba Community Recycling Centre or participating retailers like ALDI, Bunnings, Coles, Woolworths, Council's administration building and Battery World.
